

**Outcome 1: 80% of youth will not be arrested during the time of program participation.**

Shelter - Tracked from discharge paperwork when youth is released. Collected by program Manager

School Intervention - Yes, directly from probation and community corrections. We have operating agreements.

Skills - We track this by talking with youth in the program. We talked with Juvenile Probation about being given these numbers, but they are unable to give these to use without a release.

Tutoring - Have access to juvenile arrest records

Counseling – Have access to juvenile arrest records

Teen Court – Review of QUEST (links the Court to law enforcement, school, Department of Child Services, and Juvenile Probation) and/or self report

Recreation - Review of QUEST (links the Court to law enforcement, school, Department of Child Services, and Juvenile Probation) and/or self report

Parenting - Parents feedback and court dockets

**Outcome 2: 80% of youth will not be arrested for 6 months following program completion.**

Shelter - Tracked using follow up phone calls or information from referral sources . Need further ideas for this, as often phone numbers change by 6 months after release. Also, probation or DCS will not likely be willing to look up all of these youth for us to check for arrest data.

School Intervention - Yes, can be attained from probation and community corrections but requires additional follow-up not currently in place

Skills - Promising Futures is developing a survey to complete with youth 6 month following program completion. Participants will be contacted by phone and asked a list of questions, including whether they have been arrested.

**Outcome 3: 75% of participants show improvement on pre/post measurements or maintain progressed gained (knowledge-and/or skills-based) designed for each Youth Service Bureau specific program.**

Shelter - This could be based on counseling, independent living sessions, groups such as drug and alcohol, etc.

School Intervention - Yes, currently using pre/post surveys

Skills - See attached Pre-post test. Given test on first and last day of class. Results are included in Quarterly reports.

Tutoring - grades in classes, performance on acuity, which is given 3 times per year, performance on standards-based classroom assessments

Counseling – Grades in classes, performance on ISTEP

Teen Court – Responsibility survey

Recreation - 40 Developmental Assets to be tracked minus Commitment to Learning category (Assets 21-25).

Parenting - Pre/Post tests with each session and/or beginning and end assessment

**Outcome 4: 75% of participants will continue to show academic progress and/or demonstrate a reduction in risk factors which interfere with academic success and/or an increase in protective factors with facilitate academic success during the time of program participation.**

Shelter - Tracked using a form that is sent to school with the youth each day. Form can track their behavior at school as well as homework completion.

School Intervention - Yes, with post surveys (Needs review)

Skills - The facilitator completes quarterly reports based on the Clinical Anger Scale that they are given at the beginning and end of class (see attached). This is also indicated on the pre/post test.

Tutoring - We use a survey developed by Diehl Consulting, Inc., a consulting firm in Evansville, Indiana with whom we worked on a federal Safe Schools/Healthy Students grant.

**Outcome 5: 80% of clients indicate an improvement in life circumstances/relationships in an evaluation survey developed by the service provider or by IYSA for use with clients. \*Providers are to survey a minimum of 12 clients or 20% of their caseload (whichever results in a larger number) randomly selected from each county served.**

Shelter - Track using a survey created as explained in outcome.

School Intervention - Yes, with post surveys (Needs review)

Skills - All participants complete a Feedback Survey at the end of services. Participants are surveyed in February and August with the Family Client Satisfaction Survey

Tutoring - To create new survey

Counseling - Diehl Instrument

Teen Court - Respondent Survey, to be modified prior to July 2014

Recreation – Quarterly Outcome Survey

Parenting - We have them fill out survey at the end of the class.
